### **We Make Up His Kingdom**



The end of the Christian Year approaches with the celebration of Christ the King this coming Sunday. Those who put the Christian calendar together realized that there is no better way of ending the Ecclesial Year than by proclaiming Jesus Christ our Savior as the King of kings and Lord of lords.

The Book of Revelation closes the collection of Holy Scripture that we know as the Holy Bible, and in it this proclamation of Jesus as the supreme king is at the very beginning of the book. In chapter 1, the writer states, "...from Jesus Christ, the faithful witness, the firstborn of the dead, and the ruler of the kings of the earth."

We follow Christ because we are convinced that there is no other to follow who would do for us what Jesus does. His Way of Love means exactly what the words stand for. By becoming flesh God's beloved Son emptied Himself of all the heavenly glory that He shared with His Father since before the beginning of creation, and lived as one of us, and even died a shameful and horrible death on a cross that we might have abundant and true life.

Is there a love that surpasses Christ's love? His love is so great and unconditional that not even the powers of darkness and death were able to retain Him. He is the supreme

Lord and King of all human and otherworldly powers. But His kingdom is not shown in violence or oppression of any kind, even if it would be violent suppression of the unjust rulers of the world. Christ's Kingdom is, in His own words, "not of this world."

It seems paradoxical to many that the most powerful of all kings cannot simply suppress all evil in the world through His intervention. This has led some to unbelief in His promise to restore all creation to God's governance of justice, peace, and harmony for all. But Christ's will and the Father's will are one. And God created us free from the beginning—even free to make the wrong choices. It is only through our willing turning to God's Way of Love that the world will be transformed into what God has always meant it to be.

If we declare that Christ is our supreme ruler, then we need to be aware that we are the ones who make up His Kingdom. A kingdom is not made up of a king only. There is a kingdom only when there are people who are under the king's rule.

Unlike earthly kingdoms or other types of earthly government, though, where most of the time those who govern care little or nothing for those who are governed, and where an elite class usually takes advantage of most of the people, the King we serve is one who is willing to give His own life for us, and wants us to share in His glory at all times.

The task that He gives us, then, has nothing to do with satisfying a ruler's whimsical demands, but it is the task of putting into practice His Way of Love, in words and deeds, so that others may also become part of His blessed Kingdom of reconciled and true life with His Father and our Father.

As the writer of Revelation puts it, when he refers to Jesus Christ our Lord, "To Him who loves us and freed us from our sins by His blood, and made us to be a kingdom, priests serving His God and Father, to Him be glory and dominion forever and ever. Amen."
